A MESSAGE FROM THE PASTOR

Dear friends and members of Bethesda Presbyterian,

During this season, at Bethesda, we are looking more deeply at the Lord's Prayer with the hope that it will enrich our prayer life and deepen our fellowship with God. As we look around at the world today, it is evident that people are hungering for connection. They want more meaningful and genuine relationship.

In the Lord's Prayer, Christ does not merely invite us to repeated His words. He is inviting us to pray "in this way" or "in this manner" (Matthew 6:9). He wants His prayer to be a model for prayer.

Ultimately what we find is that Lord's Prayer teaches us is not simply to repeat special words or merely talk to God. Instead, the Lord's Prayer is an invitation to step into a relation, to step into Jesus Christ's relationship with his Father. Christ wants us to pray in Him, taking on his childlike status and position with the Father. This ought to change how we think about prayer! But, more importantly, putting this into action will draw us into deeper connection and fellowship with God the Father and His children.

Youth and Family Ministry Programs

Bethesda offers programs for the spiritual growth of the whole family.

Family Fun Night The first Sunday of the month from 4:30-6:30 pm. This family Bible Study is perfect for families with children pre-K through 5th grade. It includes dinner, music, games, and crafts.

Faith Weaving Friends This program brings together 2nd-5th graders every third Friday of the month from 5:30-7 pm. It includes fellowship over dinner, Bible study, and fun!

Bethesda Youth Group (BYG) Geared toward 6th-12th grade students, BYG meets some Sundays from 5-7 pm (check the calendar for exact dates). Each meeting includes dinner, recreation, and a Bible Study. **NOTE:** The Youth Group is looking for adult leaders to help plan & lead activities. Adult Bible Studies Various Bible studies are offered throughout the year. Check our website for more info or contact the church office to receive notifications.

Presbyterian Women's Circles Our women's Bible Study groups meet monthly from September to May. Bethesda offers four women's circles that meet on various days and times. Please see page 9 for all the details and contact information.

Men of the Church Gathering quarterly on the first Thursday of the month, Men of the Church enjoy fellowship over dinner, a devotion, and discuss mission, outreach, and congregational support opportunities. Check the church calendar for meeting dates and times.

Sunday School Classes meet at 10 am on Sundays after the breakfast hour.

- **Nursery** (Ages 0-2) Our youngest learners enjoy time in the nursery reading books, singing songs, and learning through play and exploration.
- **Lower Elementary** (Ages 3 Kindergarten) Utilizes curriculum to teach foundational Bible knowledge. Children enjoy activities, crafts, games, and imaginative play to learn and reinforce lessons.
- **Upper Elementary (**1-5 Grade) Utilizes age appropriate Sunday School lessons while keeping children engaged through crafts, games, and fun.
- **Junior and Senior High** (6-12 Grade) Studies different books of the Bible, comparing and contrasting stories and characters.
- **Parlor Class** Studies different books of the Bible as well as theological books to gain a deeper understanding of the Word, how it applies to the world today, and to strengthen faith.
- **Jesse Wimberly** (Adult) Utilizes *The Present Word* curriculum series to facilitate instruction and discussion.
- **The Seekers** (Adult) Currently studying the Gospel of John, this class studies and discusses how they can apply God's Word together.

Youth Update

This January the Youth Sunday School class started to read the book of Acts, written by Luke. We learned more about Peter and his preaching style (he did not hold back). He preached on repentance and the resurrection, two of the main things about Jesus, and Stephen the first martyr with Saul there watching on. One of the "first" deacons, Phillip, spread the word through his interaction with the Ethiopian. Maybe we should be more like Phillip and how he approached the Ethiopian. God gave him the opportunity and Phillip took it by helping the Ethiopian to understand what he was reading, the book of Isaiah. Phillip was not pushy, but was ready when the opportunity arose to tell someone about Jesus. Saul's conversion and how the apostles reacted to him and other believers is another interesting lesson in the book of Acts. Then there was Ananias and Sapphira, the married couple who lied to Peter and what happened to them. We learned about the replacement of Judas, the Holy Spirit coming to the apostles, talking in tongues, the role women played, why we need to understand the Old Testament and so much more. If you have not read Acts, now is the time to start.

Some of the youth and older youth, went on an Henster Adventure to Starworks in Star. It was a perfect time to go since we had some snow. Frozen with Fire & Ice, we got to make two glass snowmen by using a blow torch and glass. You put the ice in the fire and created three snow balls and combined them. Then the details were added, the hat, scarf, and face. Smiles, laughter, and fellowship was had by all the bundled up. No one was hurt and nothing caught on fire. Each snowman was unique.

Evangelism

Evangelism is about Love; Epiphany is the season of Love; and February is the month of LOVE. Although the Greeks defined nine types of love, we most closely associate Agape ($\dot{\alpha}\gamma\dot{\alpha}\pi\eta$ love with the church). But we should also consider Philia, Pragma and Storage loves – particularly in the season of Epiphany.

Agape love is defined/described as "an unconditional love that is not dependent on any external factors." It seems fair to argue that a society without Agape would be unable to function, as we are dependent on one another as a species. However, Philia ($\varphi\iota\lambda\iota\alpha$) love implies "spiritual connection, trust, and sharing of the same values;" and Pragma ($\pi\rho\dot{\alpha}\gamma\mu\alpha$) love is an "essential component of making relationships work in the long term being based on duty, reason, and shared goals."

That brings us to Storge $(\sigma \tau o \rho \gamma \dot{\eta})$ love, which "relates to love within a family." An example of storage love is when a parent cares for a child, makes them feel secure, comfortable, and safe, and doesn't expect anything in return. During Epiphany we hear the voice of God the Father saying these words. "This is my son, my beloved, with Him I am well pleased." The account of the Transfiguration contains the additional charge, "Listen to Him" (Luke 9:35 NRSV). In "Soul Physicians" Robert Kellemen says this about the nature of the Trinity, "They were experiencing constant, uninterrupted, intimate, relationship. They were together, in harmony, giving, sharing, relating – loving" (Soul Physicians pp 62).


Epiphany is designed to orient us to this divine love that is constantly being given and received - a love that has its root in the Trinity, is meant to encompass humanity, and all of the world by extension.

Finally, do not forget Valentines Day and our Valentines Day luncheon where the Men of the Church are hosting this event to show our love for the women of our lives.



Stephen Ministry

Stephen Ministry is about Love and Caring



As we approach our training sessions, many are trying to discover God's vision for your life and your spiritual gifts. As part of Stephan Minister training, we help prospective ministers answer six simple exploration questions. (Questions are easy – Answers are hard)

The first three are internal to the Stephen Ministry process and relate to recruitment. Stephen Ministers are commissioned by their Congregations. As such they must be able to help Congregations answer:

- How can we help people at our church discover and develop their own unique spiritual gifts?
- How can we help people fulfill their passion to use their gifts in meaningful ministry?
- How can we move away from endlessly searching for people just to fill slots—and move toward an approach that focuses on the gifts God has given people?

The second three questions are for future, prospective and current Stephen Ministers. Our training helps the individual to discover:

- · What are my spiritual gifts?
- Where does God want me to use my spiritual gifts?
- How can I find a useful ministry that is personally rewarding? (Some finish the training only to find their calling to be for a different ministry. There are over 10,000 trained Stephen Ministers who were not commissioned as Stephen Ministers, but used their training to be successful in other ministries.)

History Corner

Faith Presbyterian Church

The following was submitted by Rev. H. D. Wood in the November 1882 report to the Mission for Freedmen:

The work in my field at present is for the most part encouraging. At Blue Crossing (what is now Aberdeen) especially our church is going forward at a surprising rate. They set an example of zeal for the other churches in my field to imitate. They decided to move from the temporary structure in which we worshiped heretofore, and in which we organized in October last. This decision was made on the 1st of last month, while I was there, and they assured me that when I came again (August 1) we should hold our meetings in a nice new church. When I reached there on Saturday, the day before our appointment, I found they had kept their word, and by determined effort put to shame all similar attempts at church erection that I have witnessed since I have been in this part of the country. They had secured a lot of ground in a good location, and built theron one of the neatest frame churches to be seen in this county. It is larger than any of the churches on my field, being 35 by 25, and in the little time they gave themselves to finish it they had gone so far as to have the windows and doors. I was more surprised at this than at any other feature of the work, because hitherto our churches have been considered complete without these. "Glass" windows never entered into the question of church-building here. As far as they have gone the work is neatly and well done. They have yet to ceil and paint the house which they will do as soon as possible. When finished it will be valued at about five hundred dollars. We held our communion service on the first Sunday in this nice new building, and it was a joyful meeting. The house would not accommodate the large number that assembled, though two hundred people were seated in the church. Three adult persons were added to our membership, and three children by baptism. So the glorious work goes on at this place, where a short time ago the prospect was very gloomy. The opposing and disturbing element is quite subdued, and my highest hopes for this church and people I believe will by the goodness of the Lord, be realized.
